DISTRICT DESCRIPTION

The Ponca Public Schools is an accredited PK-12 public school district in Northeast Nebraska. With an enrollment of 442 students, the district is large enough to offer outstanding educational opportunities and small enough to personalize education for each student. The district comprises of two schools: Jackson School, serving students in grades PK-2 and Ponca School, serving students in grades 3-12. Competent and caring teachers provide outstanding learning opportunities and place high expectations on their classes. Curricular offerings include basic skills instruction for all students and specialized courses in high school. Teachers participate in Professional Learning Communities to focus on individual student outcomes and develop professionally. Technology plays an important part of each teacher's program with computer-assisted reading and math instruction, computer classes, and industrial technology offerings. The district operates a 1:1 initiative with Chromebooks for every student PK-12. The majority of students from Ponca attend two or four-year colleges upon graduation. Extra-curricular activities begin in grade seven and include instrumental and vocal music, a wide variety of athletics, drama, speech, FBLA, and student government. The Ponca Public Schools enjoys positive working relationships with the City of Ponca, Village of Jackson, Village of Waterbury, Village of Martinsburg, Ponca Community Education Foundation, Better Ponca Community Foundation, Ponca State Park, Ponca Athletic Boosters, Ponca Music Boosters, Ponca Area Community Club, Ponca Ministerial Association, Youth Sports Organizations, Ponca Recreation, local businesses, and many individual patrons.

DISTRICT ENROLLMENT

SCHOOL NUTRITION

Ponca Public School District operates two kitchens (Jackson and Ponca) for the purpose of preparing and serving school lunches. The Jackson kitchen has two staff members and the Ponca kitchen is staffed with four employees. The district participates in the Educational service Unit Coordinating Council's Food Cooperative, which provides for lower food and supply prices through the statewide competitive bidding process. The district averaged 355 meals per day during the 21-22 school year with a total of 62,384 meals served.

2021-2022 School Year

Written by Ponca Public Schools Superintendent, Brendan Calahan

This year, Ponca Public Schools finally got back to some sense of "normalcy," as students were able to attend school with no COVID masking or distancing restrictions, and most activities welcomed back full fan attendance!

The district welcomed Brendan Calahan as Superintendent, Kylee Kephart as Kindergarten teacher, and Danielle Sparks as an Art teacher. Our student enrollment was 451 students, including 126 PK-2nd Grade students who attended Jackson Elementary, and 325 3rd-12th grade students who attended the Ponca Campus.

US News and World Report named Ponca High School the 2021 #1 high school in the tri-state, Sioux City Metro area. The same rankings placed Ponca High School #1 among all rural high schools in Nebraska, and #7 among all high schools in Nebraska regardless of size. The metrics these rankings are based off include College Readiness, State Assessment Proficiency, State Assessment Performance, Underserved Student Performance, College Curriculum Breadth, and Graduation Rate.

Ponca students continued to excel both in and out of the classroom. In the Fall season, our Volleyball team finished as Conference Runners Up, and Brody Taylor qualified for the State Cross Country Meet. Jarret Buckles was named Homecoming King, and Addie McGill was named Queen. Our One-Act team finished as Conference Runners Up as well, with Lucas Hoesing named Outstanding Male Actor. Finally, our Pep Band finished as Runners Up in the annual Battle of the Bands competition in Pender. Academically, 11 competitors were named Academic All-State for the Fall season. This includes Austen Janssen and Brody Taylor in Cross Country, Brady Carnell and Aidan Cook in Football, Lucas Hoesing and Abbie Hrouda in Play Production, Julien Buckles and Peighton James in Softball, Alyssa Swick in Unified Bowling, and Abbie Hrouda and Addie McGill in Volleyball.

In the Winter, our Girls Basketball team made a 4th consecutive State Tournament appearance, after finishing as both Conference and District Champions! Dalton Anderson and Aidan Cook both qualified for the State wrestling tournament, the former for the 4th consecutive time, as he will finish as one of the most decorated wrestlers to ever compete for Ponca. Our Speech team saw one of the most successful seasons in Ponca History, and qualified a whopping 12 competitors for the State Speech Meet, including Brennan Beach, Abby Fernau, McKenna Hammer, Brooklynn Lowe, Ashten Finseth, Lucas Hoesing, Ally Schamp, Cade Statema, Lexi Swick, Kennedy Harding, Grace Rooney, and Zoe Kastning! Not to be outdone, our Band had 24 All-Staters, including Grace Hansen, Karen Alvarado-Mendez, Grace Rooney, Matthew Lentz, Abby Fernau, Miguel Balvantin, Bradley Lentz, Ellesyn Hrouda, Ethan Goodier, Michael Hamilton, Austen Janssen, Connor Schamp, Chase Kastning, Brennan Beach, Abbie Hrouda, Brooklynn Lowe, Claire Burrell, Lucas Hoesing, Brady Carnell, Matthew Hayes, and Junior Highers Addyson Chytka, Aveyana Simon-Cook, Mia Krusemark, and Michael Ney. Matthew Hayes was named Snowball King, and Alyssa Swick was named Queen. 7th Grader Kaylee Kloster was one of only 62 contestants who qualified for the Regional Spelling Bee in Omaha, and 5th and 6th graders Ashlin Bacon, Hayden Hatcher, Brooks Kephart, Liam Korth, Hannah Reuter, Karlee Rohan, Peyton Sjobom, Delaney Stark, JT Stroud, and Sofia Voss all qualified for the Sing Around Nebraska Choir event in Fremont! Cole Jackson, Evan Keller, Abbie Hrouda, and Addie McGill brought home Academic All-State Honors in Basketball, Grace Rooney and Lexi Swick in Speech, and Aidan Cook in Wrestling.

The Spring brought even more success. Our artists cleaned house at the Conference Art Show. Of 25 pieces entered, 23 won awards, including Emma Berg, Bella Brummond, Peighton James, and Karen Alvarado-Mendez all bringing home 1st place in their sub-category, Alyssa Swick, Abbie Hrouda, Bella Brummond, and Lexi Swick winning Best of Category, and Lexi Swick bringing home Best of Show! Our golfers finished as Conference Champions, including Grant Sprakel as individual Champion, and Grant went ahead and qualified for the State Golf Meet as well! In track, the boys finished as Conference Champions, and 12 athletes qualified for the state track meet, including Abbie Hrouda, Matt Logue, Taylor Korth, Brody Taylor, Claire Burrell, Ellie McAfee, Dalton Lamprecht, Ellesyn Hrouda, Ethan Eifert, Julien Buckles, Gracen Evans, and Brady Carnell. To cap the Spring season, Cole Jackson was Ponca's 1st ever National FBLA Qualifier! Spring saw us bring home more Academic All-State honors, as well, including Miguel Balvantin in Golf, Lucas Hoesing and Austen Janssen in Music, and Caiden Bellows, Brady Carnell, Abbie Hrouda, and Addie McGill in Track.

In April, 11 students were inducted into the National Honor Society, including Julien Buckles, Michael Hamilton, Cole Jackson, Evan Keller, Mattie Milligan, Alyssa Schamp, Miguel Balvantin, Andrew Brinkmann, Brady Carnell, Lily Korth, and Grant Sprakel.

Finally, Ponca High School graduated 38 seniors on May 7th that combined, won over \$150,000 in scholarship money. Alyssa Swick earned Valedictorian, and Aidan Cook earned Salutatorian. We also graduated 42 Kindergartners and 28 Pre-Schoolers. The future is bright for Ponca Schools!

The end of the school year saw the departure of High School Principal Derek Lahm, 4th grade teacher Mishelle Fields, and long-time Ponca Elementary Secretary Patti Boyle. The Ponca Community Educational Foundation sponsored a year-end luncheon, where they awarded \$13,572 in Special Use Awards to staff throughout the district. A fantastic end to a fantastic school year!
