DISTRICT DESCRIPTION

The Ponca Public Schools is an accredited PK-12 public school district in Northeast Nebraska. With an enrollment of 441 students, the district is large enough to offer outstanding educational opportunities and small enough to personalize education for each student. The district comprises of two schools: Jackson School, serving students in grades PK-2 and Ponca School, serving students in grades 3-12. Competent and caring teachers provide outstanding learning opportunities and place high expectations on their classes. Curricular offerings include basic skills instruction for all students and specialized courses in high school. Teachers participate in Professional Learning Communities to focus on individual student outcomes and develop professionally. Technology plays an important part of each teacher's program with computer-assisted reading and math instruction, computer classes, and industrial technology offerings. The district operates a 1:1 initiative with Chromebooks for every student PK-12. The majority of students from Ponca attend two or four-year colleges upon graduation. Extra-curricular activities begin in grade seven and include instrumental and vocal music, a wide variety of athletics, drama, speech, FBLA, and student government. The Ponca Public Schools enjoys positive working relationships with the City of Ponca, Village of Jackson, Village of Waterbury, Village of Martinsburg, Ponca Community Education Foundation, Better Ponca Community Foundation, Ponca State Park, Ponca Athletic Boosters, Ponca Music Boosters, Ponca Area Community Club, Ponca Ministerial Association, Youth Sports Organizations, Ponca Recreation, local businesses, and many individual patrons.

DISTRICT ENROLLMENT

The district had maintained a steady enrollment over several years, which dropped slightly over the past five years. Enrollment ranged from 431-468 students (PK-12). Below is a breakdown of total enrollment, by grade, for the last 16 school years.

SCHOOL NUTRITION

Ponca Public School District operates two kitchens (Jackson and Ponca) for the purpose of preparing and serving school lunches. The Jackson kitchen has two staff members and the Ponca kitchen is staffed with four employees. The district participates in the Educational service Unit Coordinating Council's Food Cooperative, which provides for lower food and supply prices through the statewide competitive bidding process. The district averaged 312 meals per day during the 22-23 school year with a total of 56,219 meals served.

TRANSPORTATION

The school district maintains a vehicle fleet consisting of small vehicles and buses, responsible for transporting students to and from school and school-related activities. All student transportation drivers (route and activity) have been provided a minimum of two hours in-service training. The school completed the pupil transportation safe riding and conducted emergency evacuation drills at least twice during the past year. All vehicle inspections, post trip checks and regular scheduled mechanics inspections and corrections have been completed on all vehicles used for pupil transportation.

This school year was yet another in the never-ending string of fantastic years for Ponca Schools. 2005 Ponca grad Allison Stansberry joined the staff as 7-12 Principal, and Katie Pick joined as a 1st grade teacher. Both are fantastic additions! The district served 443 students, including 132 PK-2nd graders at Jackson Elementary, and 311 3rd-12th graders at the Ponca Campus.

The year kicked off with a bang as Ponca student-athletes shined brighter than ever in the Fall sports season. The volleyball team finished with a Conference Championship and a Sub-District Championship, falling just one game shy of qualifying for the state tournament. Not to be outdone, softball set a school record for wins, and won their own Sub-District before falling just one game shy of their state tournament, and Junior Brody Taylor rounded out our Fall sports by bringing home a 7th place medal from the Cross Country State Tournament after a dominating regular season! Cole Jackson was named Homecoming King, and Abbie Hrouda Queen.

Our Fine Arts saw more success, as our One-Act team brought home a top five Conference finish, Quiz Bowl finished as Conference Runners-Up, and our own Brooklynn Lowe was named to the All-State Choir! Nine students brought home Academic All-State Honors for the Fall season, including Brody Taylor in Cross Country, Brady Carnell and Evan Keller in Football, Taylor Fleury and Abbie Hrouda in Play Production, Julien Buckles and Taylor Fleury in Softball, and Abbie Hrouda and Ellie McAfee in Volleyball. Finally, Senior Gracen Evans was chosen as one of six students from the State of Nebraska to sit on a student panel at the State Education Conference, sharing perspectives with school leaders on issues important to today's students.

In the winter, the success train steamed ahead. Our Girls Basketball team made a 5th consecutive state tournament appearance after finishing as regular season and tournament Conference Champions, as well as District Champions. Along the way, Legendary Basketball Coach Bob Hayes picked up an unheard of 500th win as a varsity coach, and was named the Jim Winch Award Winner for service to the Lewis and Clark Conference. At the State Basketball Tournament, Ponca Schools won a 7th Sportsmanship Award, given to schools to display outstanding sportsmanship from the players, student section, and fans – this is an outstanding honor as many schools haven't won even one of these, let alone seven! At the end of the calendar year, longtime school board members Kenton Book and John Gill retired from their school board service after leading the district for more than 20 years, and were replaced by newcomers to the board Casey McGhee and Christina Luebe. We will be forever grateful for the service of Kenton and John! Our Band continued their tradition of qualifying a ridiculously long list of 22 musicians for Class C All-State Band, including Abbie Hrouda, Grace Hansen, Claire Burrell, Brady Carnell, Bradley Lentz, Connor Schamp, and Addison Steward in Wind Ensemble, Karen Alvarado-Mendez, Brooklynn Lowe, Abby Fernau, Oliver Persinger, Trysten Allison, Miguel Balvantin, Mia Krusemark, Ellesyn Hrouda, Michael Hamilton, and Nate Coffman in Symphonic Band, and Lilly Egdorf, Mike Ney, Tim Ney, Aidan Simons, and Brennan Statema in the Junior High Division. Karen Alvarao-Mendez was also named to the Quad-State Honor Band held at the University of South Dakota! Evan Keller and Ellie McAfee were named Snowball King and Queen, and Ponca had seven students named to Academic All-State, including Cole Jackson and Nolan Janssen in Boys Basketball, Abbie Hrouda and Ellie McAfee in Girls Basketball, Ella Eifert and Lexi Swick in Speech, and Connor Schamp in Wrestling. winters on record (we even had to bring in dump trucks to remove snow piles from campus when we ran out of room for new snow), we finally made it to spring after numerous snow days and late starts!

Even the spring sun couldn't outside our students, as Jazz Band kicked off the Spring season with a 3rd place finish at the Northeast Jazz Festival, with Brady Carnell named outstanding soloist. Per usual, art students once again cleaned house at the Conference Art Show. Along with numerous 2nd and 3rd place finishes, Adison Bostwick, Bella Brummond, and Julien Buckles brought home 1st place ribbons in their respective categories, Peighton James brought home Best in Category for Watercolor, and Lexi Swick was named Best in Show for her 2-D piece, "Hope."

Athletically, what a season it was. Golf brought home a ton of hardware and won a Conference Title before qualifying the entire team for the State Tournament, including Miguel Balvantin, Grant Sprakel, and Jace Wahls individually. Girls Track also brought home a Conference Title, and Ellesyn Hrouda qualified for the State Track meet in the 1600 and 3200, bringing home 8th place in the 1600. Boys Track completed the Trifecta by ALSO bringing home a Conference Title, and qualifying for the State Meet were Brody Taylor in the 1600 and 3200, Michael Hamilton in the Discus, the 4x4 Relay Team including Jaden Kay, Brody Taylor, Dalton Lamprecht, and Ethan Eifert, who then went ahead and qualified in the 100, 200, and 400 meter dashes just for good measure. Brody brought home 6th place finishes in both the 1600 and 3200, and Ethan added his own 6th place finish in the 400. Six students won Academic All-State for the Spring, including Claire Burrell and Abbie Hrouda in Music, Evan Keller and Dalton Lamprecht in Boys Track, and Julien Buckles and Abbie Hrouda in Girls Track.

A whopping 13 students were inducted into National Honor Society, including Karen Alvarado-Mendez, Brooklyn Lowe, Brody Taylor, Brailyn Hogan, Josilyn Martin, Zain Stark, Dannika Touney, Peighton James, Guy Severide, Ellesyn Hrouda, Connor Schamp, Alexa Swick, and Emma Uthof.

Ponca High School graduated 27 seniors, who brought in a staggering \$207,892 in scholarship money. Abbie Hrouda earned Valedictorian, and Summer Prokop Salutatorian. 31 Pre-Kindergartners, and 31 Kindergartners also walked the stage to end the year, setting us up for continued success for quite some time at Ponca.

Finally, the end of the year saw the departure of Spanish Teacher Jill Camargo, Jackson Elementary Music Teacher Amber Van Regenmorter, and a staple of Ponca High School, History Mike Brandt after 34 years of outstanding service to our kids and community. The Ponca Community Educational Foundation once again sponsored a year-end luncheon for our staff, where over \$26,000 was awarded in Special Use Grants to staff, including funding the addition of three new Agriculture classes at Ponca High School for the 23-24 school year. As always, this was a fantastic end to a fantastic school year!
