Ponca School is excited to announce that we have been selected as a northeast Nebraska host school for the Husker Nation "Tour of Excellence" on Monday, March 12, 2007. This program is designed to motivate and inspire elementary through middle level students. University student-athletes and student-leaders will share messages regarding education, life skills, and decision-making. The program is for students in grades 5-8, is scheduled to begin at 1:30 p.m. and will last for approximately 75 minutes. Students from Allen, Newcastle and Emerson have also been invited to attend. It will be held in the Ponca School west gymnasium. Ponca School wishes to thank the Ponca Athletic Boosters for their investment of time and funding for this program.

The 2007 Dixon County Health Fair will be held at the Wakefield Public School this year. The Health Fair will begin at 1:00 p.m. Secondary students from Emerson, Wakefield, Newcastle, Allen and Ponca, will rotate through four sessions centered on topics for teenagers. The public is invited to attend any or all of the events at the 2007 Dixon County Health Fair.

Pre-registration for the 2007-08 school year will take place at Ponca School the end of March. Students in grades 8-11 will begin the process at school then bring their pre-registration forms home to be reviewed by their parents. Parents are asked to sign the form and the student is to return it to school. It is important the students take the pre-registration seriously as the schedule for next year is created from the students' selections.

The Ponca Public School requests your help in locating handicapped children. The school implements the Federal Handicapped Childrens' Act (PL 94-142) and Nebraska statute which quarantees a free appropriate educational program for all children between birth and 21 years of age. If you have students or know of any young person who meets these criteria, please contact Superintendent's office.

#### Test Taking Success!

Just hearing the word, "TEST", could send anyone into an anxiety attack. Tests are a fact of life. While your child may never like to take tests you can help him/her do their best.

Your child will be tested throughout the school year on skills that he/she has learned in order to meet

classroom, district, state, and/or national standards. This year the ITBS (Iowa Tests of Basic Skills) standardized tests will be given to students in grades 2-6, 7, 8,9 and 11, the week of March 12-16. Standardized tests measure your child's performance, or how well they are learning in different subject areas. The test results will give information about your child's strengths and weaknesses in each subject area.

Daylight savings time has been designated to begin Sunday, March 11, the day before tests begin. Please keep this in mind, as your child might need to go to bed earlier Sunday night so they feel rested Monday morning.

The following are some strategies to help your child be successful not only on the ITBS tests, but also on various tests given throughout the school year



- Make sure your child has a regular bedtime to allow an adequate amount of sleep each night. This is especially important before taking a test.
- Provide your child with a healthy breakfast to provide energy for his/her
- Make sure your child arrives at school on time every day.
- Encourage your child to complete and hand in daily homework assignments-Practice makes progress. We can encourage children to study and practice so they can do their best, just as we encourage them to practice a musical instrument or sports skill, so they can do well at a recital or on game day.
- . Study day-by-day. DON'T CRAM! Studies show that most people remember facts better when they review and repeat them in several short segments over time, rather than trying to cram a lot of information in one longer session the day before or the day of the test.
- · Provide a consistent place and time at home for your child to complete homework.
- Encourage your child, before bedtime, to gather and put in his/her book bag all homework and materials needed at school the next day. Have your child place his/her book bag in a certain spot in his/her room or by the front door, so he/she can grab the bag easily when leaving for school.

To help your child do his/her best on homework and tests is to provide positive support by expressing confidence in your child's ability to do their best. Try to provide a calm, stress-free environment each morning as your child gets ready for school. Get up in plenty of time to avoid morning rush and anxiety. If you know your child is going to take a test try to curtail nighttime extra-curricular activities and outings that may interfere with their regular routine.

# "What's New in Room 2022"

#### English 7

The seventh grade students have had a year full of learning and they seem to be transitioning into junior high well. They started the year reading The Pigman by Paul Zindel. From there, they moved into the literature textbooks and enjoyed discussing short stories and poems with a variety of themes and from a variety of cultures. When they came back from the holiday break, Mrs. Hassler and I introduced the "Let the Rabbits Run" unit, where they have been exploring their interests and backgrounds. They have been writing quite a bit, using the six traits of writing to improve their skills. The year will end with grammar and a review of the eight parts of speech.

#### English 10

The first and second semester English 10 classes started with the six traits of writing. They spent time learning about each trait and wrote papers to build on that knowledge. The next step was into the descriptive world of Willa Cather in My Antonia. The classes connected their lives to Cather's depictions of life in Nebraska from the early 1900s. Each semester concludes with a three to five page research paper over a topic of their choice.

#### Advanced English 12/English 12

The English 12 classes have been the new addition to Room 202 this year. We have been making our way through the literature timeline, focusing mainly on British literature. The year began with <a href="Beowulf">Beowulf</a> and then moved backwards to Greek literature, reading large portions of <a href="The Odyssey">The Odyssey</a>. Mrs. Hassler came in to start the scholarship unit with us and we worked on grammar, creativity, and detail in the scholarship answers. I have been pleased to see many of them using their knowledge from this unit to fill out various scholarship applications. Our year has taken us up to the Enlightenment period so far and we will continue working to Post Modern literature. They will soon begin their last major writing assignment for English at PHS with a six to eight page MLA research paper.

Parents are reminded that the career unit will be worth 25% of students' fourth quarter grade, so it is very important that the sophomores keep up with their work in and outside of class.

Soon they will be working on the second part of the Junior career unit, having completed a resume and professional interview during the first semester. #### Elementary and Junior High Keyboarding-Mrs. Taylor

The 4th grade class dived into keyboarding the first semester. They memorized all the keys and worked on their "no peek" technique. The 5th, 6th and 7th grade classes spend a semester working to improve their speed and accuracy goals. They also learn to type numbers, format and

proofread a variety of documents. The 7th graders will be working on a multi-page report and more 3 and 5 minute timings.

## **Elementary and Junior High Physical Education**

The 5th and 6th grade PE classes did a variety of activities the first semester. They swam and hiked out at the park and worked on soccer, football and volleyball skills. They also learned several new jump rope skills, performed a tinickling routine and played some very competitive basketball games. # **Business and Computers News by Suzette Curry**

**Computers:** The students have been working with Microsoft Excel creating both simple and more advanced spreadsheets. They learned how to enter formulas to find sums, averages, minimum and maximum values. Then students created PowerPoint presentations on the history of a topic that interested them. After learning about internet safety and advanced search techniques, students are writing an MLA style paper.

Advanced Computers: After a review of advanced Word and Excel techniques, the Advanced Computer students began working on web pages. Students began by creating a few simple web pages in html code, and then the students created multi-page websites using Microsoft FrontPage. Thanks to a grant from the Ponca Community Education Foundation, students used digital cameras to create electronic portfolios of their color-themed photographs while learning how to use digital cameras and photo editing software. Currently, students are learning to use voice recognition software and Microsoft Access.



**Keyboarding 8:** The eighth graders have been busy typing. The first nine weeks of class, they are working on their keyboarding technique, accuracy and speed. Thanks to fabulous early keyboarding instruction, our students are skilled typists. Next nine weeks, we will be working on learning basic document formatting in Microsoft Word. Students will learn how to create headers and footers, set tabs, and format columns.

Accounting: The accounting students have completed the entire accounting cycle for a sole-proprietorship, service business. Students especially like to play Monopoly and record their transactions in special journals. At the end of the game, they like to calculate the player with the highest net worth. Students learned cash procedures including how to maintain a personal checking account. A big **Thank You** goes to the Bank of Dixon County for supplying us with checking account practice packets each year.

**Business Law:** Students have learned about both criminal and civil offenses and the trial procedure for each. We are now studying contract law. To help students learn, a variety of teaching strategies are used including: mock trials, concept sculptures out of junk, student-made visual aids, and Court TV cases.

**Future Business Leaders of America:** This year there are 67 FBLA members. We participated in the Haunted Hayride at Ponca State Park as our fundraiser. In September we had a bonfire at the state park and in December members enjoyed lunch and a movie during semester testing week. In November, we had a guest speaker from Hamilton College in Lincoln. Upcoming activities include our game night in March and a field trip to Sioux Falls in April. Our president is Zach Kramper, vice president is Justin Curry, secretary/treasurer is Anne Langhorst and Heather Bennett is our reporter.

# March Madness in 5th and 6th Grade

March Madness is approaching quickly and the entire buzz about the school is basketball, but little did we know the learning continues on. The sixth and fifth grade students are full aware of how well our basketball teams have done and continue to do. Our students' knowledge does not just stop there, but continues on in the classroom:

As for the Math Department: In math both the fifth graders and sixth graders have been working on measurement and geometry. Measurement and geometry are fun concepts for the kids to learn about. The sixth graders get to use protractors and compasses. They are hard at work drawing circles and all sorts of shapes. They know how to measure angles and can find the circumference of a circle. The fifth graders have been using their rulers to measure all sorts of things around our room. They know what a polygon is and can name three sided shapes such as triangles all the way up to ten sided shapes like decagons. They have also been working on finding the perimeter of different shapes. Both of the classes will be getting into fractions and decimals in the next chapter.

As for the Social Studies Department they have been traveling back in time to the days of the Revolutionary War and Ancient Greece.

The sixth graders are studying about the Greek history as well as their influence to other civilizations. They have spent a week acting as a citizen of a own Greek Polis, following the ruler of the Ancient Athens. They will be finishing the unit by illustrating and writing a Greek Myth or by performing a play of a Greek Myth.

The Fifth graders have been studying how we gained our freedom. They just finished learning about various battles of the Revolutionary War and are now ready to learn about the U.S. Constitution.

As for the Science Department: The Fifth graders are experimenting with Newton's Three Laws of Motion. They will be able to identify which law or laws is being used at specific task. Also the students are experimenting with friction, gravity, forces and many other concepts that go with motion. The fifth graders will create their classroom rainforest when they start their ecosystem unit the beginning of the third quarter.

The Sixth Graders can feel the earth shake below their feet and feel it tumbling down, a tumbling down. Okay some old lyrics from an old song, but they are learning about the earth's crust and all the good or bad things it can do. They are studying about the tectonic plates and the different boundaries they have, fault, separating, and colliding. The sixth graders will also be helping out with their past experience of building a rainforest, but this year they are going to be understanding the effects of human activities on an ecosystem.


