Parent- Teacher Conferences - The District has scheduled Parent-Teacher Conferences to be held in Jackson and Ponca according to the following schedule:

Friday, November 3^{rd} - Jackson Elementary, 4:00 p.m. – 8:00 p.m. Monday, November 6^{th} - Jackson Elementary, 4:00 p.m. - 8:00 p.m.

Ponca K-12, 4:00pm - 8:00 p.m.

Tuesday, November 7th - Ponca K-12, 4:00pm - 8:00 p.m.

These conferences are one of the best ways you can learn about your child's educational experience. We invite all parents to attend conferences to communicate with teachers regarding your child, or children's, progress in school. The conferences at the elementary schools will be held in the child's classroom and are scheduled at 15 minute intervals. Elementary teachers will soon be sending notices home with children with the scheduled times for parents to conference with teachers. Secondary teachers will be available in the west gym for parents to see on a "drop in" basis. Please try to keep secondary conferences to 10 minutes.

If parents feel as though more time is needed to conference with your teacher, please make an appointment for another time.

Here are some tips that can help you have a more successful parent-teacher conference:

- PLAN FOR IT- Before you come to conferences, write out questions thay you would like to ask the teacher. Here are some suggestions:
 - o Does my child get along with others?
 - o How is my child's behavior in class?
 - o Does my child read at the level you would expect for this grade?
 - o Is my child able to do the entire math that you would expect for a student at this grade?
 - o What are my child's strengths and weaknesses?
- **KEEP AN OPEN MIND** Your goal is to work for cooperation between you and your child's teacher. Even if the teacher says something you may disagree with, try to listen to what she/he has to say.
- ASK TO SEE YOUR CHILD'S WORK There is no better way to see how your child is progressing than to
 look at his/her school work.
- **ASK FOR SUGGESTIONS** If your child is doing well, ask what you can do to keep things on a positive track. If there are problems, ask what you can do to help.

WINTER WEATHER - SCHOOL CANCELLATION

With the approach of the winter months, it is important to be informed about the process as to whether school will be cancelled for the day, or whether there will be a late start or early dismissal. There are many factors to be considered before making the decision to cancel classes, to start late, or to dismiss early. First, and foremost, is the safety of students, faculty, staff, and parents. Such a decision is not to be taken lightly.

Technology has helped to provide early warnings regarding the approach of inclement weather. Radar and satellites have helped to make forecasts much more accurate. During the winter months, much attention is paid to these forecasts, the track for such storms, and their potential impact on our area. As storms approach, calls to other school district superintendents are made to see how the weather is affecting their area, and what decisions they are making. Traveling the country and hard surface roads of our district is done to check their condition.

Prior to 6:00am, a decision will be made whether to cancel school, or to start late for the day. A phone call is then made to a central number in Sioux City and the information is released from there to area radio and television stations. Information is also available online. The website for this information is: http://closings.siouxland.com.

There are occasions when the weather patterns and forecasts are clearly obvious that a decision can be made the night before. When this happens, a call will be made to local radio and TV stations to air the announcement on the 10 o'clock news. However, this is not always possible. Should the decision be made to start late, this will always be for a **two (2) hour** late start. Classes will start in Jackson and Ponca at 10:30am. Buses will run their regular routes, but will be two hours later than normal.

Occasionally, weather conditions will deteriorate during the school day to a point where early dismissal is necessary. We will try to avoid early dismissal if possible because contacting parents is difficult. Parents may, during inclement weather, pick up your child/children at your own discretion. Please make arrangements for the care of your child in case an early dismissal is necessary. In case of an early dismissal, all activity practices will be cancelled.

The following is a list of where announcements about school cancellation, late start, or early dismissal can be seen or heard.

Following are some helpful hints as parents prepare:

- Know your bus route. Know who is picked up or dropped off before and after your stop. Contact other bus patrons on your route for information regarding the location of the bus.
- If you are going to be gone from home and the weather looks questionable, make arrangements for your child to have a neighbor or someone to meet your child, especially younger children.
- Please do not call the school or administrators to find out if school is cancelled. Please listen or watch for announcements.
- Parents have the right to make the decision whether to send their children to school when the weather is questionable. If the parent decides that the child will stay home, school work missed will be required to be made up. The child will not be charged with an unexcused absence.

Fall Parent- Teacher Conferences are scheduled for November 6 and 7 in Ponca and November 3 and 6 in Jackson. Conferences will run from 4:00-8:00 p.m. each night. Conferences are held in the child's classroom for students in grades K-6 and in the west gymnasium for students in grades 7-12. Parent-Teacher Conferences are a scheduled time to connect with your child's teachers. The Parent-Teacher Conference is a good time for important people in a child's life to meet and plan the best strategies to help that child develop skills for success in school and life. It is an opportunity to ask how your child is performing academically, behaviorally and socially. If your child has talked about a concern related to school, it is a good time to discuss the matter with the teacher.

The academic assistance program, "Get 'R Done" will be starting second quarter for students in grades 5-12. Each Tuesday and Thursday school is in session, "Get 'R Done" will be available for students after school from 3:30-4:30 p.m. The program is designed for students who request after school assistance for help with assignments and test reviews and for students who are assigned to attend to finish incomplete assignments. The program will be run as it was last year with teachers available to work with students after school. Parents will be notified if their child is assigned to "Get 'R Done" when homework has not been completed.

Help child learn how to shrug off teasing.

Parents walk a fine line in handling teasing of their children.

They want to take their child's teasing seriously, but they don't want him or her to become a perpetual victim or tattletale.

"Wonder Time" magazine gives these tips:

Acknowledge that it's hard for kids to simply ignore teasers.

Tell your child stories of when you were teased, to give him or her a sense that teasing is universal and surmountable.

Avoid the temptation to cast teasers as bad guys. Instead, help kids to think about why teasers behave the way they do. Is it the only way they know to get attention? Kids can even ask teasers why they're acting this way, which may cause the teasers to examine – and eventually change – their behavior.


Ask the teachers or other adults how they are teaching kids acceptable and unacceptable behavior and encouraging compassion among the children.

A key to shrugging off teasing lies in children's own selfconfidence, which comes not from being told to be confident, but from actual successes kids accumulate as they grow up,







Fall is here and winter is right around the corner. The fifth and sixth grade classes have been busy working on a variety of projects. Conference time is not far off and we are looking forward to seeing all of you. Scheduled times will be sent home with your son or daughter and everyone will have an opportunity to speak with each of the three teachers. More details will be sent home soon.

November is full of exciting events. The fifth and sixth graders are looking forward to their annual Thanksgiving Feast. It is a wonderful meal filled with good food, good atmosphere, and a great Thanksgiving spirit. Another activity that we are excited for is our "Create a Culture" project. The students' will increase their understanding of what makes cultures unique, as well as increasing their appreciation for similarities and differences that exist among cultures. The students will be designing a fictitious culture and deciding its history, how it developed, changed, and how it is now growing.

We hope that everyone has a great fall season and look forward to seeing you at conferences.



Family & Consumer Science Christy Schweers

FCS-I have two sections of FCS this year. This is a yearlong class that gives my students and I an opportunity to really get to know one another. The first unit of study we completed was on Personal Development. This included chapters consisting of the unique you, everyday living skills, steps to success, and careers. These chapters included lessons on understanding yourself and self-concept, making a good impression, communication skills, citizenship and leadership, acting responsibly, the decision-making process, setting goals, careers, and being successful on the job. The students are also working on a portfolio that includes projects or activities related to each chapter.

HEALTH-This is a one semester class for freshman. This is also a graduation requirement at Ponca High School. We have studied making healthy choices, personality and self-esteem, and managing stress. We are moving into the chapter on alcohol during Red Ribbon Week.

STUDY SKILLS-This is a class for 7th grade students. I meet with the girls Monday and Wednesday and the boys Tuesday and Thursday. We have learned various tips and techniques to become a better student. An emphasis was placed on time management and organizational skills. Ask your 7th grade student what 'SQ3R' and 'SLANT' stands for. Having completed the study skills portion of the class, 2nd quarter we will begin lessons on juggling life's choices.

ADULT LIVING-This class helps to prepare our teenagers for life after high school. The chapters studied have included looking toward your future, using problem solving, building character, and balancing your life. Lessons have included topics on values, resiliency, goal setting, interdependence, problem solving tools and techniques, developing a strong work ethic, code of conduct, ethical standards, time management, and Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs.

FOOD SCIENCE-1st quarter this class has determined what food science is, why we should study food science, and how to properly use laboratory equipment. Some of the lessons we have studied have included DNA and biotechnology, viewpoints on food biotechnology, preserving biodiversity, what is happening to the world's population, and how agriculture affects us all. The students have conducted experiments on food labels and nutrition, using an electronic balance, and the importance of precision in measurement.

WAYNE, NE – Seasonal flu, bird flu, mumps, the common cold; the list of the infectious diseases we can catch goes on. As the cold and flu season approaches, many wonder how best to protect themselves and their families against these bacterial and viral germs.

We buy tissues with antivirals, antibacterial soap, disinfectant wipes and alcohol-based hand gel. However, some research suggests that being too clean can impair the development of our immune systems. Concern has even been raised that widespread use of antibacterial products may drive germs to become resistant to medicines. So what are we to do? One of the best protections is rather simple and therefore often overlooked. Simply, cover your cough or sneeze and wash your hands with good ol' soap and water – often and long enough. When soap and water are not available, the use of hand gel or wipes is the next best option.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the single most important thing we can do to keep from getting sick and spreading illness to others is to clean our hands. It reports that a study of 305 school children found that youngsters who washed their hands 4 times a day had 24% fewer sick days due to respiratory illness and 51% fewer days due to upset stomach. It has also been estimated that proper hand-washing could eliminate close to half of all cases of foodborne illness.

The newest educational guidelines also recommend coughing or sneezing into your elbow or shoulder instead of your hands as many have been taught. This helps decrease the spread of germs to frequently touched surfaces such as doorknobs, telephones, computers and shopping carts. "Whether we are talking about a flu pandemic, the mumps or a local outbreak of norovirus, washing hands and surfaces often can be one of your best lines of defense," said Kelly Heithold, Community Health Specialist.



One-Act Competition



This year's One-Act cast has been busy practicing their lines for competition over the past month and a half. We have gone a different route this year, trying for more of a dramatic outcome in "Memorial" by Tim Kelly. This play follows a family as they watch a veteran's day parade and remember their own lost soldier.

Guest Clinician---Cheri Helmer-Riensche

Cheri Helmer-Riensche is presently in her thirty-first year of teaching Secondary Choral Music in the State of Nebraska. She is also an active adjudicator and guest conductor for show choir and choir festivals and contests throughout the United States. She has presented sessions at the Nebraska State Choral Directors and the Nebraska Music Educators Associations' State and Regional Conventions. In the summer, she is on the staff of the Butler Show Choir Summer Showcase in El Dorado, Kansas and this summer was one of four clinicians working in an educational partnership with the Omaha Community Playhouse.

Mrs. Riensche has served the Nebraska Choral Directors Association as President for two terms, and was the Choral Chair for the Nebraska Music Educators Association where she was in charge of the Nebraska All-State Chorus. Her choral ensembles have performed and competed on the state and national levels of competition and have appeared on public and educational television. They have sung with several college choirs, the Albert McNeil Singers of Los Angeles, California, Maestro Robert de Cormier of New York City, The Omaha Symphony and Opera Omaha.

Chosen Outstanding Teacher of the Year in 1992 and 2000, Mrs. Riensche was also the recipient of the Nebraska's Spirit of the Prairie Award and the Admiral of the Nebraska Navy Award (presented then by Governor Bob Kerry) runner-up for the Frieda Draft-Beatty Teacher of Excellence Award from the University of Nebraska at Lincoln, and was twice runner-up for the Seward County Citizen of the Year while teaching at Seward High School. In 2002, she was presented the Alice E. Buffet Award for outstanding educators in the Omaha Public Schools. In 2003 she received the Wayne State College Outstanding Alumna Award, and in the winter of 2004 was named Nebraska's Choral Director of the Year.

As an advocate of music for all children, Mrs. Riensche has created a high school music curriculum for students with severe and profound mental and physical disabilities. Besides teaching her music class for students with special needs, her responsibilities include directing the Freshman Choir, Concert Choir, Men and Women's Choruses, Titan Show Choirs, Co-Sponsor of the Senior Class and co-directing the all school musical.
