The safety of students is always a concern especially as they arrive and leave the school each day. There is a large amount of traffic on the streets at the beginning of the school day and again at dismissal time and safety must be everyone's concern. The following reminders are given to parents and community members who drive in the vicinity of the school during the school day:

- 1. If you do not need to drive by the school from 7:45 to 8:15 in the morning and again from 3:15 to 3:45 in the afternoon, it would be less congested and safer for everyone.
- 2. Washington Street is barricaded every school day for recess. PLEASE DO NOT DRIVE AROUND THE BARRICADES! The students are not looking for cars as they head for the playground.
- 3. If dropping off or picking up students from school, try to avoid Washington Street. The buses unload students in the morning there and double-park there in the afternoon. It is much safer to meet your children around the corner or other agreed-upon spot on one of the other streets.
- 4. Court Street is also a dangerous street especially in the afternoons. Cars parked along this street must back out into the street and it is very congested.
- 5. Please do not park in the crosswalks the city has painted on the streets. We have many students who walk to and from school and those crosswalks need to be kept clear for those students.
- 6. During the fall, football players walk to the ball field for practice and in the spring, the track athletes practice on the streets. Your consideration for these students is appreciated.

School will return to regular schedule on Monday, September 11, 2006. School will begin at 8:25 a.m. and dismissal will be at 3:25 p.m. for elementary grades and 3:30 p.m. for secondary students. Bus pick-up and drop-off times will be adjusted accordingly.



## From the Principal's Pen...Ms. Rinas...

Thank-you is extended to our parents who attended "Parents Night at School." The parent attendance for students in grades 7-12 was the best we have ever had! Remember you can check your student's grades and attendance through our on-line student management system. If you never had or forgot your password you can contact Mrs. Hayes or Miss Rinas at school and we will get you set-up. If you have a concern about your child's grades or school work, please contact the teacher. Attendance concerns can be directed to your child's principal.

If you are a parent of a senior or sophomore student, mark Tuesday, September 26, on your calendar. On this date a Josten's representative will be at Ponca School. The representative will meet with the Sophomore Class at 10:30 concerning class rings. At 11:00 he will meet with the Senior Class concerning announcements and graduation products. The representative will return to Ponca School on Tuesday, October 3, for orders. Senior orders will be taken at 10:30 and sophomore orders at 11:00. Students placing orders will be allowed to attend the second meeting. Parents are welcomed to attend any of the meetings.

The middle of our first quarter is September 21. Midterm Reports will be processed and sent home with students on September 27, 2006. After you review the Midterm Report with your child, please sign it and have your child return it to school. If you do not receive your child's Midterm Report contact the school and one will be mailed to you.

New at the 7-12 level this year is a change in how student detentions are managed. A student who earns a detention will have 24 hours to serve the detention. The student may serve it on the day it is issued or the next school day. All detentions are served after school at 3:35 p.m. Students in detention are required to complete a behavior learning packet and or reflection form related to the infraction. The learning packet and reflection form are designed to have the student reflect on their misbehavior and identify changes s/he might make to avoid earning detention time again. A student will not be allowed to practice or participate in school activities until the detention is served. When a student earns a detention a notice will be sent home to the parents informing them of the reason for the detention and the date by which it is to be served. A student who does not serve detention by the due date will earn a second detention or may be referred to the principal.

## A good start

Did you know that breakfast is the most important
meal of your child's day? It
provides the nutrients and
energy he needs to concentrate in school. Research
even shows that kids who
eat breakfast get better
grades, pay more attention
in class, and behave better. Help
your youngster begin his day on the
right foot.

#### Make time

Set the alarm to allow 10–15 unhurried minutes for breakfast. Suggest several healthy breakfast items, and let your child choose. Tip: If your youngster doesn't like to make decisions first thing in the morning, give him breakfast choices the night before.



#### Make it healthy

Give your child a mix of protein (such as milk, eggs, cheese, or meat) and carbohydrates (whole-grain cereal, fruit, or whole-wheat bread). The carbohydrates boost energy and help your child jump-start his day, while the protein keeps his body going strong until lunchtime.

### A note from Carol Conrad/SLP Speech-Language and Hearing Services



On Monday, September 11, 2006 all of Ponca's elementary and secondary students will have had their hearing screened and or tested. The ESU's audiologist (Vernae Luhr) and several

of the speech language pathologists, either screened and/or tested the entire student body's hearing. Those parents, whose children have a known hearing loss, as well as those with possible medical concerns will receive a letter, sent on that day, stating such. Any child who was discovered on the 11<sup>th</sup>, to have a possible new hearing loss will have their hearing tested again, to confirm the new hearing loss, within one month. If a loss is confirmed, at that time, a letter will go out to the parents informing them of their child's hearing loss. If you did not receive a letter by the end of September concerning your child's hearing difficulties, you may assume he/she has passed the hearing screen and has normal hearing levels. I am, again, in the Ponca School on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. If you have any questions concerning your child's hearing or speech/language development, please feel free to contact me.

## TO ALL PARENTS OF STUDENTS ENROLLED AT PONCA PUBLIC SCHOOL

As a parent of a student at Ponca School, you have the right to know the professional qualifications of the classroom teachers who instruct your child. Federal law allows you to ask for certain information about your child's classroom teachers. It also requires us to give you this information in a timely manner if you ask for it. Specifically, you have the right to ask for the following information about each of your child's classroom teachers:

- Whether the Nebraska Department of Education has licensed or qualified the teacher for the grades and subjects he or she teaches.
- Whether the Nebraska Department of Education has decided that the teacher can teach in a classroom without being licensed or qualified under state regulations because of special circumstances.
- The teacher's college major; whether the teacher has any advanced degrees and, if so, the subject of the degrees.
- 4. Whether any teachers' aides or similar paraprofessionals provide services to your child and, if they do, their qualifications.
  If you would like to receive any of this information, please contact the Superintendent's office.





## HUNTER SAFETY CLASSES






## Please Save Pop Tabs for the Ronald McDonald House





#### Senior

- Request applications and brochures from your target colleges. Use FastWeb's College Search at www.fastweb.com to help narrow your college choice.
- ☐ Take the SAT and/or ACT in the fall, if you haven't already.
- ☐ Take honors or advanced classes. Challenging courses show that you are prepared for college coursework.
- Schedule interviews with prospective colleges. Practice your interview skills before heading in for the actual interview.
- If possible, visit your prospective colleges before you make your final decision. If you cannot travel, see if any schools offer a virtual tour online.
- ☐ Set up a budget for college and application costs.
- Get your applications in order by creating files for target schools. Make a list of application requirements (essays, transcripts, recommendations, etc.) and deadlines for each.

- Request letters of recommendation from teachers and employers at least three weeks before you need them.
   Provide a list of accomplishments for their reference.

#### Scholarship Scams Tip Sheet

#### 10 Scam Warning Signs

Several of these red flags could be an indication that you're dealing with a scholarship scammer:

- 1. Fees: Scammers use bogus fees such as "application," "disbursement," "redemption," and "processing fees" as a way to take your money. Scholarships should <u>not</u> require any fees. Check out the *free* search at <u>www.fastweb.com</u>.
- 2. Credit card or bank account information needed: Never give credit card or bank account info to receive aid. If you have, call your bank or credit card issuer immediately.
- 3. Scholarship guarantee: No one controls judges' decisions. Be wary of "high success rates," which often refer to award matches, not award winners.
- 4. No work involved: Legitimate scholarship applications require time and energy. No one can complete them for you.
- 5. No contact information: Before you apply, confirm the sponsor's contact info. The sponsor should supply a valid e-mail address, phone number or mailing address (not a PO box) upon request.
- 6. Unsolicited scholarships: If you are called to receive an award for which you never applied, be alert. Ask where the sponsor got your name and number. Then follow up.
- 7. Pressure tactics: Don't allow yourself to be pressured into applying for a scholarship, especially if the sponsor is asking you to pay money up front.
- 8. Claims of "exclusive" scholarships: Legitimate sponsors won't restrict knowledge about their award to a single service.
- An official-sounding name or endorsement doesn't automatically mean legitimacy: A sponsor may use words like "national," "education" or "federal" or have an official-looking seal, but might still be a scammer.
- 10. Your questions aren't answered directly: Can't get a straight answer from a sponsor regarding their application, what will be done with your information (e.g., if it will be sent to a third party) or other questions? Proceed with caution.

#### Scam-Spotting Rules of Thumb

- Don't pay money to get money.
- ✓ Too good to be true? It probably is.
- ✓ Spend time, not money.
- ✓ Legit scholarships are never guaranteed.
- ✓ Feel suspicious? Trust your instinct.

#### Suspect a Scam?

If you think you may be dealing with a scammer, follow the directions below:

- Save everything you receive from the suspected scammer.
  Include all correspondence, e-mails or other paperwork.
  Make sure everything is dated.
- Take notes during any seminar or phone conversations. Record the date, time, phone number and the person's name with whom you spoke. Also include a detailed account of your conversation.
- 3. Report the suspected scammer to local law enforcement, your guidance counselor and any of the following organizations:
