From the Desk of the Superintendent

Traffic Considerations - Construction of our new high school building has forced the District to change school bus pick-up and drop-off locations for students. Students are becoming accustomed to the new pick-up/drop-off location along 2^{nd} Street on the north side of the elementary building. For the most part, things seem to be working out quite well.

We would like to ask the cooperation of parents regarding parking your vehicles at the end of the day as you wait to pick up your child. Please do not park along 2nd Street as this can create congestion with vehicles, and student traffic in the street when buses get ready to leave. This can present a dangerous situation that we can do without. I know that parking close to the school entrance is attractive and convenient. But, at the same time it puts vehicles and students into a situation that is potentially dangerous. Please make arrangements with your child to pick them up at a site away from 2nd Street and the school buses. Your cooperation in this matter is greatly appreciated.

November 8th - No School for Students - The 2010-11 school calendar, first approved by the Ponca Board of Education, listed Monday, November 8th, as a regular day of school for students. Since that time, the District has found out that Ponca High School will be hosting the Lewis & Clark Conference Vocal Music Clinic on that same date. Approximately 250 high school students from several conference schools will be in the high school building during the day requiring "home room" sites for those schools, rehearsal areas, and lunch facilities. It would be almost impossible for the District to hold regular class session during the day.

Monday, November 8th, will be a no school date for students. Certified faculty will report to school that day to assist with Vocal Music duties and to work on Staff Development activities. Students will not have to make this day up.

Students were treated to root beer and orange floats on the front lawn. We have made it through the first hot days of the school year and are back to our studies and activities.

Because the school is concerned with the safety and welfare of our students and spectators at school events, we will not allow children of any age to play unorganized football and group games in the open area surrounding the football fields at home or away events. Parents please supervise your children and do not allow them to bring footballs and other sports balls to football games. Thank-you for helping to keep our sporting events safe for people of all ages!


The Homecoming Dance on Saturday, September 11, will be the first dance of the 2010-11 school year. As in the past students in grades 9-12 and their guests may attend the dance. All students and their guests will be breathalyzed prior to being admitted to the dance. Parents will be notified and the consequences as stated in the school policy, "Guidelines for Extra-Curricular Activities" will be applied to any student whose breathalyzer test is positive.

On September 21, students in grades 8, 10, and 12 will participate in the Nebraska Risk and Protective Factors Student Survey. The survey is given to students in participating schools across the state of Nebraska. The survey questions have been designed to measure key behaviors and risk and protective factors without asking sensitive questions, although it is possible that some questions may be considered sensitive by some persons. The survey includes questions related to alcohol, tobacco, and other drug use; related risk and protective factors; and antisocial and violent behaviors. It is important to remember that the survey is anonymous, so no student response will ever be able to be connected with a student. Each student's participation in this study is completely voluntary. At the beginning of the class period when the survey will be administered, the teacher will read a prepared statement that informs the students that their participation is voluntary. They will be given the option to decline to participate, or to skip any question that they prefer not to answer. Students who decline to participate in the survey will be provided with an alternative activity to do while the survey is being administered. Likewise, parents have the option to choose not to have their student participate. Recent federal guidance indicates that schools may use passive consent to participate in the survey, but must inform parents of the survey opportunity and provide them with a mechanism for opting their student out if they so desire. If you do not wish your child to participate in the survey you may call Miss Rinas at the school and request that your child opt out of the survey.

The Jostens Ring and Announcement Company will be at school on Tuesday, September 21, to present their products to sophomores and seniors. They will meet with sophomores at 10:30 A.M. concerning class rings and seniors at 11:15 A.M. concerning announcements and senior products. Jostens will return to school on Tuesday, September 28, to take orders. Senior orders are scheduled for 10:45 A.M. and sophomore orders for 11:15 A.M. Senior and sophomore parents are welcome to attend the meetings. Stop in the Principal's office so we can give you a visitor's pass and direct you to the room in which the class is meeting.

Before the end of September, "Midterm Reports" for the first quarter will be processed. Students will receive the reports on Thursday, September 23. Parents are asked to please review and sign your child's report. In order to participate in or attend school activities, students are required to return the signed report to the school by Wednesday, September 29. Contact the school if you do not receive your child's midterm report so one may be mailed to you. You can also access you child's grades on PowerSchool, the student management system. Contact the school if you need your web login and password.

We hope your child's school year is off to a great start! We look forward to seeing you throughout the school year and especially at our first Parent Teacher Conferences scheduled for grades 3-12 on September 28. Our first conferences are scheduled after the midterm, but before the end of the first quarter. This will give our teachers and parents an opportunity to discuss any concerns they have about a student's academic progress and work together with the student on a plan for success before the first quarter ends.

Notes from Principal Bob Hayes,

The school year is off and running! We had a very good start and everyone is settling into a routine. The students and teachers seemed very eager to get school underway. I hope we can say this in April!

Like last year students in Jackson will enter the building through the south doors at the beginning of the day. Parents, please be sure to use the correct driveway entrance when entering the parking lot. The north drive is the entrance and the south drive is an exit only. In Ponca students enter through the east door. Please drop students off on Court Street to help keep the bus drop off area less congested. Please make it a priority to pick students up after school on time. School is dismissed at Jackson at 3:10 and at Ponca at 3:25. If a student has other arrangements for pick-up after school other than their normal routine please notify the school by phone call or a written note. Please do not leave it up to the student to relay the message.

When regular school hours begin on Sept. 6th the entrance bell will ring at 8:15am at Jackson and the tardy bell will ring at 8:30am, any students that are not in their desk at 8:30 are considered tardy. It is very helpful to have students here at 8:20, by arriving at 8:20 they can get things taken care of before 8:30 and classes can start on time without interruption. At Ponca, the entrance bell will ring at 8:10 and the tardy bell will ring at 8:15.

Students are not allowed to bring footballs (or any other type of ball) to football games. If a student brings a ball to a football game it will be taken away and not returned. We had numerous problems with injuries and spectators being hit with balls.

Student pictures will be September 22nd at Ponca and September 23rd at Jackson.

A note from Carol Conrad/SLP Speech-Language and Hearing Services

On Thursday afternoon August 26th and Friday morning, September 3rd, 2010 all of Ponca's elementary and secondary students will have had their hearing screened and or tested. The ESU's audiologist (Vernae Luhr) and several of the speech language pathologists, will either screen and/or test the entire student body's hearing. Those parents, whose children have a known hearing loss, as well as those with possible medical concerns will receive a letter, sent on that day, stating such. Any child who was discovered to have a possible new hearing loss will have their hearing tested again, to confirm the new hearing loss, within one month. If a loss is confirmed, at that time, a letter will go out to the parents informing them of their child's hearing loss. If you do not receive a letter by the end of September concerning your child's hearing difficulties, you may assume he/she has passed the hearing screen and has normal hearing levels. I am in the Ponca School and Jackson School full-time. If you have any questions concerning your child's hearing or speech/language development, please feel free to contact me.

Please note: If your child receives a Medical referral, it means the audiologist recommends that a medical doctor examine your child's ear(s).

TO ALL PARENTS OF STUDENTS ENROLLED AT PONCA PUBLIC SCHOOL

As a parent of a student at Ponca School, you have the right to know the professional qualifications of the classroom teachers who instruct your child. Federal law allows you to ask for certain information about your child's classroom teachers. It also requires us to give you this information in a timely manner if you ask for it. Specifically, you have the right to ask for the following information about each of your child's classroom teachers:

- 1. Whether the Nebraska Department of Education has licensed or qualified the teacher for the grades and subjects he or she teaches.
- 2. Whether the Nebraska Department of Education has decided that the teacher can teach in a classroom without being licensed or qualified under state regulations because of special circumstances.
- 3. The teacher's college major; whether the teacher has any advanced degrees and, if so, the subject of the degrees.
- 4. Whether any teachers' aides or similar paraprofessionals provide services to your child and, if they do, their qualifications. If you would like to receive any of this information, please contact the Superintendent's office.

The Ponca Public School requests your help in locating handicapped children. The school implements the Federal Handicapped Children's Act (PL 94-142) and Nebraska statute which guarantees a free appropriate educational program for all children between birth and 21 years of age. If you have students or know of any young person who meets these criteria, please contact Superintendent's office.



HOSPICE OF SIOUXLAND'S FAMILY **GRIEF SUPPORT GROUP**

Hospice of Siouxland is offering grief support groups for children and teens ages 6 to 17 who are grieving the death of a loved one. Groups are held every other Monday during the school year, with a break during December and January. Meetings are from 6:00 – 8:00 p.m. at Siouxland PACE Center at 313 Cook Street, Sioux City (old HyVee on 4th and Hamilton). Supper is provided and daycare is available for younger children upon request.

Professional staff and trained volunteers provide a safe place where families can participate in the healing process. Age-appropriate activities and discussion empower each age-group to express feelings, share memories, learn coping skills and normalize the grieving process.

At least one adult family member must attend the adult support group, in the same time and location. We are now offering a Spanish language adult group as well as the English language adult group.

There is no fee, however families can make donations for an amount with which they are comfortable. Preregistration is required. Parents or guardians may mail in the enclosed registration form or call Hospice of Siouxland at 712-233-4144 or 1-800-383-4545 in either English or Spanish.

Notes from the School Nurse, Sheila Herfel, RN

A quick reminder that all students must meet state requirements for immunizations, birth certificates, physicals and eye exams. If you have received notice from the school that your child is missing these items, please bring these records to the school as soon as possible. If your child received any immunizations over the summer, please send a copy, so we can update our records.

BACK TO SCHOOL TIME TO CHECK FOR HEAD LICE

Now that school has started, parents are encouraged to check for head lice as part of their family's regular routine. Families should make checking for lice as basic an activity as brushing their teeth or washing their hands. Head lice are common among elementary school students because young children have a lot of contact with their classmates.

Lice are reddish-brown wingless insects; lice eggs, or nits, are grayish-white, always oval shaped and are attached at an angle to the side of the hair shaft. Products over the counter can be purchased to control the lice. If it continues to be a problem, you should see your physician.

Some tips in combating head lice are:

- *Check children and watch for signs of head lice, such as frequent head scratching
- *Remove all nits with a comb or fingernails to assure total lice treatment
- *Use a medicated shampoo, lotion of cream rinse, but remember that all lice-killing products are pesticides and label directions should be followed.
- *Check with your physician before using lice treatment pesticides if the child has allergies, asthma or epilepsy.
- *Wash bedding and clothing in hot water and dry in a hot dryer.
- *Articles that cannot be washed can be vacuumed or placed into a plastic bag and sealed for two weeks to kill all lice and nits.
